FROM PEW TO PULPIT Today: The Rev. Dr. John Helt

"CHRISTIAN NATIONALISM: THE FALSE WHITE GOSPEL" with Jim Wallis Friday, April 6 + 6:00 to 8:30 p.m.

Jim Wallis, author of several books, including *God's Politics*, will offer a discussion on his latest book, *The False White Gospel: Rejecting Christian Nationalism, Reclaiming True Faith, and Refounding Democracy* at the **United Methodist Church of Whitefish Bay**. In this new book, scheduled to be released on April 2, Wallis argues that it's time to call out genuine faith – specifically the "Christian" in White Christian Nationalism – and invite all who can be persuaded to reject and help dismantle a false gospel that propagates white supremacy and autocracy. VIRTUAL WORSHIP SURVEY RESULTS Over 65 participated! *Thank you!*

One of the significant (*and positive*) changes we've experienced in our worship life is the opportunity to attend worship online *or* virtually. Earlier this winter, virtual Immanuel worshipers were invited to respond to a brief survey to help Immanuel's special membership task force learn more about when, why, and how often people worship virtually. A bulletin announcement invited responses as well as a special invitation to everyone who had signed the "Virtual Worship Sign-in Sheet" in 2023. The survey included questions like: *Do you attend the virtual service instead of coming in-person? Why or why not? What do you like about worshiping virtually? What would make the virtual service more meaningful to you?*

This survey was one of the first projects of a **special membership task force** appointed by the Session last fall to explore the meaning of church membership in our congregation, in our wider community, and in our denomination. Members of the task force include: Sibyl McCarley, Lindsey McKee, Mike Gillard, and the ministers, from the Session; Steve Anderson, and "mostly virtual worshiper" Terry Lee-Docken.

Over 65 virtual worshipers responded (thank you)! The responses reflect an **overall appreciation for the opportunity to worship virtually**. Health challenges, geographic limitations, and competing commitments were all reasons cited that encourage people to worship virtually rather than in-person. The responses, including some related to possible improvements to the virtual production quality, will be included in the overall interim ministry evaluation process in the coming months. One immediate improvement made, based on a survey suggestion, is the inclusion of the hymns in the online bulletin so that virtual worshipers don't have to flip between the bulletin and a hymn document while worshiping online.

COVID GUIDANCE Masks and Updated Vaccines Strongly Encouraged by the Wisconsin Council of Churches

A recent communication from the Wisconsin Council of Churches (WCC) advised that "the current wave of COVID and other respiratory virus infections calls for increased caution and use of mitigation strategies." The council recommends masking as "the easiest, most effective way to prevent us from making one another sick," while also encouraging people to get the most up-to-date vaccine. Low vaccination rates are significant contributors to the current wave, according to the WCC, with just 19% of Americans having received the latest COVID shot.

Masks are welcomed and encouraged at Immanuel. Current and up-to-date vaccination status is required for all Immanuel employees, choir members, and members directly interacting with others such as teachers, ushers, greeters. The COVID Advisory Team will continue to review current guidelines and recommendations.

MAKING SUNDAY MORNING HAPPEN: It takes you!



This text adapts part of a traditional Irish prayer associated with St. Patrick (see also no. 6). Such a prayer for protection is known as a *lorica*, from a Latin word for "breastplate" or "armor." It is set to a Gaelic melody that gained wide popularity in the 1970s.

Psalm 51, paraphrased here, has traditionally been known as one of the seven penitential psalms, and it is used annually on Ash Wednesday. But this psalm is not just about human sinfulness; it is also about God's willingness to forgive and restore sinners. That is good news.



- 5 Thou spread'st a table in my sight; thy unction grace bestoweth; and O what transport of delight from thy pure chalice floweth!
- 6 And so through all the length of days thy goodness faileth never; Good Shepherd, may I sing thy praise within thy house forever.

Since its creation in the mid-19th century, this text has been one of the favorite paraphrases of Psalm 23 in the English-speaking world. That popularity increased in the early 20th century when *The English Hymnal*, 1906, first joined these words to this flowing Irish melody.
